

BIENVENUE

What is language? How are languages used for communication?

Language is defined as a body of words and the systems for their use common to a people who are of the same community or nation, the same geographical area, or the same cultural tradition. There are three modes of communication which can occur within a language.

Interpretive communication is defined as one-way communication with no possibility for active negotiation of meaning with the writer, speaker, or producer. Some examples include listening to a song or television show, reading a book or advertisement.


Interpersonal communication is defined as two-way communication with active negotiation of meaning among individuals. Some examples include having a conversation and sending a text message or an email.


Presentational communication is defined as one-way communication intended for an audience of readers, listeners, or viewers. Examples include telling a story, creating a brochure, writing an article, etc.

All three modes of communication are practiced and assessed in all SMSD World Language classes.

<u> Connecting to Canvas – A Guide for Students</u>

Students at BSHS use Canvas, our school-wide learning management system, to access course resources and assignments. The screenshots below will help new students understand how to access their Canvas pages. We will review this information during the first few days of class as well.






Important Information for Students

- Students will report to their homeroom during the first week of school. After a brief meeting with their homeroom teacher, students will report to a slightly shortened first block. In addition, students will report to HR resource for the first four days of school to accommodate class meetings.
- BSHS has three lunch periods. Student lunch periods are determined by their 3rd block course. Students can check the lunch schedule posted in their homeroom to see what lunch they eat. Students in Honors French 2 with me this semester will be eating 2nd lunch.
- Lockers are issued to each student at BSHS. Lockers can be used to hold supplies for classes as well as personal belongings, but it is important to remember that lockers are the property of the school district and can be searched at any time.
- The BSHS dress code was recently revised and can be reviewed by visiting the Student Handbook posted on the BSHS website (For Students \rightarrow Student Handbook \rightarrow p. 30-32).
